Hello!

We're in the first week of advent, the season of preparation for the coming of Christ. The time we self-reflect and ponder the ways in which our lives could look that little bit more like the Jesus we read about in the scriptures. This particular season we're following the Church of England's Calm and Bright campaign, encouraging everyone to find that place of calm within the chaos that Christmas can be.

This Sunday we recognise the role of the prophets in God's great story. They were those people God chose in Israel's history to speak God's truth to a people who frequently wandered away. They were often persecuted, isolated and troubled. They were brave and courageous, though sometimes fearful. They were men and women who dedicated themselves to worship, to hearing the voice of God and communicating it to God's people.

It strikes me that although the prophets were not always the calmest of people (see Elijah and the prophets of Baal for a somewhat chaotic divine face-off featuring fire and death - 1 Kings 18), they were nevertheless those who had that unique connection with God among the Hebrew people. Elijah did have some chaotic encounters but read on to 1 Kings 19 and we see Elijah seeking God and finding God not in fire, wind or earthquake, but in a still small voice...

It's in those places of calm in the chaos that we can hear the still small voice of God prompting us and guiding us, and calling us back to him when we wander. That prophetic voice calling people back to God is as relevant and necessary today as it ever was in the Old Testament. God is still the same God, and when we wander, God still calls us back, often speaking through Christians, good friends, and the Church. What might that prophetic voice look like today? What does the Church have to say to a hurting world?

Many things hopefully, but certainly in this Advent season, in a world and a season that is busier than it has ever been, it might speak of the calm that can only be found in the presence of the God whose greatest expression of love was to utterly empty God's self of all power in becoming a helpless child. Where are you finding those places and times of calm this week? When you find them, take the opportunity to ponder the magnificence of the incarnation, the story foretold by the prophets, and retold by churches everywhere.

The Uganda Mission Committee is asking if you would consider writing just one card to all your friends here and donating the money you would have spent on cards to the charity. The cards will be hung on ribbons at either side of the back of church.

We have been gifted small wooden crosses on a chain engraved with the name of our church. If you would like to buy one, they are just £1 each. See Cathy Moulton if you wish to purchase one (or more!!).
