Dear Friends,

Have you had a lot of cards this year that have nothing to do with the real meaning of Christmas? You know the ones with Santa, elves, snowmen and so on. But perhaps the ones with those nativity scenes have sentimentalised the real story and removed the 'uncomfortable bits'. Let us consider....

The stable, or more likely a cave, never has any manure – perhaps the animals were toilet trained, and a team of cleaners had been in before Mary and Joseph arrived? The animals on the cards look as though they have been groomed for best in show. The shepherds, despite living rough, are clean and tidy and the Magi have been dressed by a first century Ralph Lauren.

From the moment he was conceived, Jesus identified with the underclass of society. His parents lived in brutal and repressive Roman occupied territory. Mary was a teenage mum who could have been stoned to death if God had not appeared to Joseph in a dream. In effect, Joseph adopts Jesus as his own, but the community knew....

Mary and Joseph are a poor couple who are forced to make this arduous journey against their will. Despite hospitality being legendary in the Middle East, they find Bethlehem distinctly inhospitable. Mary gives birth in the most unhygienic of conditions and her baby is placed in a feeding trough. Jesus is born into a world of oppression, dirt and filth, poverty, violence, evil and apathy not the pristine cute world of the Christmas card. Yet well-wishers arrive – not family but strangers. The shepherds were considered some of the lowest in society – untrustworthy and unclean – yet God sends homeless strangers to welcome his son.

The Magi have social standing and gifts: They are strangers from the East,

whom the Jews look on with suspicion. They certainly didn't arrive the night Jesus was born, just after the shepherds, but several months later. However, their innocent mistake results in Herod's hit squad exterminating all baby boys under the age of 2 making little Jesus an enemy of the state!

The Christmas Story sort of rounds off with Mary, Joseph and Jesus fleeing for their lives as homeless refugees, not exactly 'happy ever after' stuff. So, the Son of God was an asylum seeker who from his very birth identified with the persecuted, illegitimate, homeless and marginalised and reminds us of how much changes as history rolls on and how little changes as history rolls on. Families are still fleeing as refugees, and innocent children are still dying on the orders of a ruthless tyrant.

Even though people will continue to debate the facts, this much we do know: Once upon a time in a small, poor place, a young woman gave birth to a baby boy. And changed the world.

Wishing you a Christmas blessed with God's love and grace.
